


CHRISTMAS CRACKERS TO CURL UP WITH!

Please see below for the latest staff recommendations of those life-changing books that you simply must read. Perhaps they might provide inspiration for some last-minute Christmas stocking fillers!




Someone Like You by *Roald Dahl*. Recommended by Mr Swift.

I recommend 'Someone Like You' by Roald Dahl. It is a collection of short stories which all have an excellent twist in the tail. This is a great book for lovers of Roald Dahl who have read his children's books and want to read more of his work. Some of the short stories were made into episodes of a TV series called 'Tales of the Unexpected'. This is a book I have read many times, and love to pick up again and again!




The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time by *Mark Haddon*. Recommended by Miss Cooke.

A great read for age 14+ with a fantastic play to accompany it. Teenager Christopher writes a book about his experiences solving the murder of his neighbour's dog. However, he uncovers far more. Christopher has autism and the way he writes is an insight into his world and the worlds of many others like him.




On The Road by *Jack Kerouac*. Recommended by Mr Frost.

Kerouac's sprawling, frenetic account of 'beat' adventures across 1950s North America helped me imagine a world beyond what I knew. I was attracted to the rebellious idea that writing didn't necessarily have to be something to craft and redraft, but something that could be an expression of the urgent and immediate rhythms of living and life. Kerouac's descriptions of the music in jazz clubs in this book are probably the best examples of this. If I hadn't read this book when I was young I don't think I'd have been imbued with the adventurous spirit that made me want to leave Wales and see more of the world. Who knows, maybe I would never have even seen Chesterfield!



The Knife of Never Letting Go by *Patrick Ness*. Recommended by Mr Pattison.

This is Book 1 of the 'Chaos Walking' trilogy by Patrick Ness. It's a great book for young adults. It's about to be made into a film so before they butcher it, it's probably worth reading! An interesting story which begs questions about privacy, gender discrimination and racial discrimination.



Seven Brief Lessons In Physics by *Carlo Rovelli*. Recommended by Mr Frost.

This is a beautifully written book for anyone who has an interest in science, space or the world around them. The writing is luminous and engaging in the explanation and application of seven main principles of physics. It draws the reader in as it turns simple ideas into complex theories and then weaves them into the world around us. I have a small hard back copy but it is available in paperback too.

DEBATING TEAM UPDATE

Initiated in 2019, students in the Brookfield Community School Debating Society work together to learn new skills and develop confidence in formulating arguments and discussing the most controversial and contentious topics. Last year, we entered our team in the prestigious ESU Schools Mace Competition, an annual national debating tournament for secondary schools.

Although only in its second year, the debating team has continued to thrive in 2020, in spite of the challenges posed by coronavirus restrictions. With continued interest and commitment the founding members returned in September 2020 and were joined by a number of enthusiastic and talented Year 12 students (Anja Raine, Sam Kitchen, Ruby Serjeant, Dan Kellett and Evie Dixon) and a further Year 13 student (Charlie Loveland). Covid-19 has presented many challenges for all of us, and this was no exception for the Debating Team. But with the help of technology the team has adapted to the circumstances, connecting virtually to discuss and debate the key issues of the time.

Currently, the team are working towards the first round of the ESU Schools Mace competition, to be held in January 2021. The pressure is on for the team to pull together points from various pieces of research on the motion: "This House believes that government economic policy should prioritise the collective happiness and well-being of the population over economic growth". This motion is highly relevant to society today, with government policy makers having to make critical decisions when balancing conflicting interests of public welfare and economic policy.

The team is also looking to collaborate with other local schools to hold debates and enter further competitions as they open up. The society has allowed not only discussion on relevant and controversial topics but created friendships, enhanced skills, developed knowledge and given members the opportunity to grow in confidence as well as ability. The experience gained through debating will benefit members for years to come.

INTRODUCING: THE ARC

Welcome to our newest facility at Brookfield Community School - The ARC.

The ARC features a number of rooms where staff and children work together to support their social, emotional and mental health. Within the ARC is the **Achieve** room, where students can chat and chill in a non-classroom environment, the **Reflection** space is a 1:1 intervention room for students to work with their key workers, reflecting and talking about any issues they may face. The **Challenge** room is a traditional classroom for small groups to attend booster classes or complete their ASDAN studies. Alongside the ARC rooms we have also created a Therapy Suite, where children have access to specialist resources and equipment to support physio sessions, sensory, relaxation and mindfulness activities. The ARC has its own garden, where students are looking forward to horticulture and gardening lessons.

Students have been very busy in The ARC this half term working on their ADSAN short courses alongside Entry Level English and Math skills. Alongside the written work, we use lots of practical resources and sessions to build skills and enhance learning. In Science, the students have been looking at an experiment to see if cans of different drinks sink or float and the reason behind this – did you know a can of Diet Coke will float but a can of regular coke will sink? They then looked at pH including an experiment to test different soft drinks.

As part of our Gardening course, we have been looking at garden wildlife, completing a survey of our school garden and researching ways to make bird feeders. We then made some using pine cones and birdseed before hanging them for our feathered friends in the school garden. In English, the students have been studying heroism, reading about Grace Darling, Harriet Tubman and 20th century heroes like Malala Yousafzai and astronauts from space missions including Laika the dog! We have used some fantastic films including first person accounts from BBC Teach to enhance the students' learning and they are now going on to write their own heroic stories.

We are incredibly proud of our new ARC facility, we are so pleased that we can offer a 'haven' for students to access when circumstances become tricky.
