If students have difficulty walking, or there is another specific reason why they must be picked up by car from the school site, please contact Mrs Old (SENCO) who will issue you with an access pass.


Psychology Trip - Science & Pseudoscience

Duke of Edinburgh Award

The new academic year began with the previous year's Bronze and Gold students giving their expedition presentations in the hall to family and friends about their exploits on DofE, thus bringing to a close another very successful DofE year. In all 48 bronze awards were completed, four students were helped to complete Silver awards started at other centres and ten students completed their prestigious Gold awards; a great level of achievement.



September saw the recruitment of 37 Year 10s and 28 Year 12s for the Bronze and Gold awards respectively and the expedition season kicked off with the annual autumn day walks.



The Bronze students met in October for a route on the hills around Castleton, taking in the views from Mam Tor and Lose Hill, whilst also traversing the Great Ridge in between. Supported by 15 members of staff, the six groups had a great day in challenging autumn conditions with overcast skies, drizzle and very strong winds. The teams practised navigation skills alongside team-building and communication.



The last event of the year is the BCS Gold Day walk in November. This year is the largest BCS gold cohort with 28 students in four teams. The idea is to step-up the challenge from Bronze and Silver and test the students on the highest terrain in the Peak District. The weather turned out to be perfect with cool but clear conditions prevailing all day. The conditions allowed students to develop their own navigation, teamwork and leadership skills as well as seeing great views across the Kinder Plateau and the Edale Valley. With the day being the 11 November, all teams stopped and observed a 2 minute silence whilst on the hill to remember those lost in past conflicts.



Once again the success of DofE over the last 12 months would not be possible without the commitment of the staff who volunteer their time to support all the expeditions.



Over the last year 25 different members of staff have deployed on expeditions giving up their time, expertise and energy in supporting our students, without them BCS DofE would not happen. Further thanks also to the staff in school who help to prepare letters and maps and deal with the financing of trips and the purchasing of equipment; their contributions are equally as invaluable.

Please note, Ann Brown, our school Careers Advisor is available in school every Wednesday. Appointments to see her can be made through Miss Metcalfe.

Our Careers Library is located in the Senior Library and is open to students from Mon-Thurs 8am to 4pm and Friday 8am to 3.45pm. Here students will be able to access up to date further education prospectuses along with information on other career pathways.

For all other Careers Information, Advice and Guidance please visit the Careers section of our website where you will find a wealth of advice including information about KS3 Options, Post 16 Options and Post 18 Options as well as key dates, useful contacts and links to other useful websites.

All students have an Employability Passport in their planner. They should be using this to record any events in or out of school that could be used in any future applications or interviews. It also highlights the ten key Employability goals that all students should be aspiring to meet.

Remember: Government legislation states that all young people should be in learning until the academic year in which they are 18 (equivalent of Year 13). This could be at school, college, an apprenticeship or job with training.

I am again delighted to announce that we have successfully been revalidated with the Gold Standard Award in Careers. This award is for those educational establishments that provide outstanding Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance. As we have successfully met the criteria, we have now been awarded the prestigious

Gold Award. An achievement that we are very proud of. *'There is significant good practice around careers, enterprise and employability at Brookfield Community School. I also take great pleasure in announcing that we have successfully secured funding from a local available grant to spend on providing two employability projects in school that will enhance students career and employability provision even further.

The first one involves a handful of departments being linked to a local employer when delivering a particular scheme of work. The aim of this is to bring the learning of the classroom to life even further by being able to make a direct link with how it would in to a real life work place.

The second project will be that we are hosting a Big Bang fair on site in February. This will include a chance for some of our students to visit a large number of interactive stalls from the world of STEM. (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths). This will also give our students chance to speak to a range of employers. Research shows that the more young people interact with actual employers, the more employable they become.

Visits to Oxford

Some of our Y11 and Y12 students have enjoyed a trip to Corpus Christi College Oxford. On two bright, autumnal days in October Brookfield students were shown the delights of this historic prestigious university. They had the chance to go inside the college's chapel and libraries as well as eat in the Harry Potter famed dining rooms. The most exciting part for students was the chance to speak to real, current Oxford students and ask questions about what life at university is really like. This was a great opportunity that left students feeling that some of the barriers to Oxbridge applications they had first imagined had been broken down.



Volunteer It Yourself

60 students from across Years 8-11 have pulled on their overalls and rolled up their sleeves to work with products provided free of charge from Wickes to create a Mindfulness area for students to use in school. They were given specialist painting and carpentry training and worked with real employers to repaint some external walls and build wooden seating to finish the area off. The students showed superb team skills, initiative and practical skills and thoroughly enjoyed the day.



Kingswood Residential Visit

In October Year 7 students set off to Kingswood for a weekend of team building and supporting one another to conquer their fears.

We were blessed with really good, warm weather and no rain, which really helped make it a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

One of our ex-students, Max Ward, was there as an instructor and certainly put the students through their paces.

Reminder from PE Department

As we begin to experience adverse weather, students are reminded of the need to wear appropriate clothing for their outdoor PE lessons.

Y12 Psychology Project

Several Y8 classes enjoyed a change to their normal lesson last week when they were involved in the Y12 Autumn Psychology Project.

The A-Level Psychology students planned and executed a variety of simple experiments on the unsuspecting youngsters, ranging from investigating the effect of rewards on cognitive performance (do sweets make you work harder) to trying to work out whether students worked more quickly on a task when music played (is word search completion rate affected more by heavy metal or Mozart).

All enjoyed the experience and the plan is to expand it to a whole year group in the future.



Extreme Weather Procedures


During the winter weather please support us in keeping students safe by ensuring that they have sensible footwear, with grips, for their journey to and from school, they can always change these when they arrive on the school site.

Spanish Exchange / Work Experience

The Spanish Exchange this year took place from Friday 4 to Sunday 13 November and we had a total of 20 Brookfield students from Years 11 and 12 taking part this year. During their nine day stay, the Spanish students had the opportunity to visit Chatsworth House, Bakewell, York, Chesterfield Town Hall to meet the Mayor and they also took part in a guided tour of Chesterfield. In addition to these visits all Spanish students completed a two day work experience in a local primary school or local café. All Spanish students were glad of the opportunity to practise their English and it will definitely be something we will be keen to repeat next year. Grace Thacker (Year 12) had this to say about their experience of this leg of the exchange.

"In November, a group of Spanish students came to stay with those of us who were participating. To start off with we were all nervous but excited about the students coming to stay, as we had never met them before. They arrived on Friday 10 November and so we were thrown in at the deep end as our first couple of days with them were on our own. The weekend started off well as most of us had arranged to meet up with others participating, so we weren't totally alone. Over the course of the 10 days they were with us, the exchange students went on many trips, including to York and Cambridge - they even experienced English school life during the day. In the evenings and weekends the Spanish students experienced English family life, and spent time in Chesterfield and the surrounding area.

Over the ten days that they were here, my exchange and I talked about various things. I learnt more about Spanish culture and how it differs to ours; we talked about the different accents within the two countries and I learnt more about the Spanish language. I really enjoyed getting to know my exchange and we became friends very quickly. I am very much looking forward to going there in January and staying with her and her family".




In the Classroom

Theatre Trips


Drama staff and students have already been on several theatre trips this term including: 'Things I Know To Be True' by Frantic Assembly at the Leicester Curve,

All three groups were excellent ambassadors for the school and showed the high quality of work produced at Brookfield.

Ellie Simpson (ex-student)

Former student Ellie Simpson was Highly Commended for the Community Award at the Chesterfield Sports Awards earlier this year.

Ellie represented England at Cerebral Palsy World Games 2015. She achieved 3 multiple gold medals at different distances though her strongest is 100m. Ellie received the award for CP sport track and field athlete of the year in 2016. Having taken a break to concentrate on her university studies, Ellie has just been reclassified to a more difficult category and is entering the National Championships in October. She is hoping to be selected to represent England again in the 2018 Cerebral Palsy games in Barcelona. In the future Ellie hopes that RaceRunning gets the recognition as a Paralympic sport it deserves.

Ellie set up her own charity called CP teens. She started fund raising and became a registered charity in March this year. They provide social events for young adults with any physical difficulty and help buy equipment to introduce more people to race running.

RaceRunning gives people with disabilities the chance to compete with the use of a specialised frame with three wheels. Each racerunner is around £2000 and Ellie has raised the money to buy 5. They are mostly based at the English Institute of Sport in Sheffield. The charity has set up offices at Chesterfield football clubs sports hub. The charity has also run seasonal race running sessions here in Chesterfield.

Online Safety

Online Safety is an important part of keeping children safe at Brookfield Community School. Online Safety is taught to all pupils and our curriculum empowers students to understand and be aware how they can stay safe and behave appropriately online but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work with you.

Your help is needed to talk to your children about how they can keep themselves safe and behave appropriately online. It's important that we are all vigilant when children are using the internet and act to ensure they are protected from people who may pose a risk to them. Children can accidentally or deliberately be exposed to illegal, unwanted or unpleasant content, comments or activity online and there are steps you can take at home to minimise this risk.

What can parents do to help children keep safe online?

Follow the "Gold"en Rules.

GROUND RULES

- Discuss together as a family how the internet will be used in your house. Consider what information should be kept private (such as personal information, photos in school uniform etc) and decide rules for making and meeting online friends. Ensure your children know the risks of accepting friends' requests from strangers online and make sure you know what your child is doing online; much like you would offline.
- Discuss using strong passwords with your child so they understand how they can protect their online accounts- talk about keeping passwords safe e.g. not sharing them with anyone or use the same password for several accounts. If your child's account is "hacked" or compromised then make sure they change their password and report any concerns or suspicious activity. Get Safe Online
Free expert advice

- Consider locating your child's computers and laptops in a family area but be aware that children access the internet on mobile phones, games consoles and tablets so use can't always be supervised.
- Be especially aware of settings rules relating to your child's use of webcams and any applications or devices which allow voice or video chat. Childnet have useful

ONLINE SAFETY

- Install antivirus software, secure your internet connection and use Parental Control functions for computers, mobile phones and games consoles to block unsuitable content or contact from unknown people. Research different parental control software and tools available for your home and select the tools which are most suitable to you, your child and the technology in your home. Visit sites like www.internetmatters.org, www.getssafeonline.org and www.saferinternet.org.uk/advice-and-resources/a-parents-guide for safety information and advice about parental controls on consoles and devices and how to report concerns.



- Make sure you read any parental guidance and safety recommendations (including age requirements – most popular social networking sites and apps are only for users aged 13+, 16+ or 18+) for any apps or websites before allowing your child to use them - visit www.net-aware.org.uk



- Always remember that parental control tools are not always 100% effective and sometimes unsuitable content can get past them, so don't rely on them alone to protect your child.

LISTEN

- Take an active interest in your child's life online and talk openly with them about the things they do. Talk to your child and ask them to show or even teach you how they use the internet, learn which websites or tools they like to use and why. Learning together with your child can often open opportunities to discuss safe behaviour online.
- To start a conversation with your child you could tell them that you understand that some young people share images and videos online and that you're interested to know what they think about it and how they think they can keep themselves safe.

DIALOGUE – KEEP TALKING

- Ensure that your child knows that once a picture, video or comment is sent or posted online, then it can be very difficult to remove as other people can forward it and share it with others, without them even knowing. www.childnet.com and www.thinkuknow.co.uk has some really useful tips and ideas for parents/carers about starting conversations about online safety.



Online Safety (continued)

- Always ensure your child knows how to report and block people online who may send nasty or inappropriate messages or content. Encourage your child not to retaliate or reply to cyberbullying and to keep any evidence.
- Make sure your child knows it's important that they tell an adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel scared, worried or uncomfortable.

Remember, the internet is an essential part of young people's lives and provides them with tremendous opportunities. The vast majority use it without coming to any harm so it's essential to be realistic: banning the internet or web sites often will not work and it can make a child feel less able to report a problem or concern, so education around safe use is essential.
