We have some fabulous projects taking place at the moment where we are embedding careers in the curriculum in a number of areas across the school. This is building on a number of projects that took place last year that brought together Year 7 Science students with United Cast Bar, Y10 English students with S42 radio, Y13 Health and Social Care students with Chatsworth Surgery, Y8 Art students with Eastmoor Nature Reserve and Y13 PE students with a local physiotherapist.

# We will update you next time on the outcome of this year's projects which include:

Year 10 Catering students linking with William Davis Homes to create a new eatery for a new housing project. The students have visited the building site and have then put together their own proposals and sample menus which have been judged by the William Davis team. The standard of food created was 'exceptional' and the students all commented on how the project had helped them understand how their Catering GCSE would link to the real world of work. A huge thank you to Ms Bolsover and Mrs Taylor for championing this project.

Year 10 Textiles students have created some botanical designs which will now be printed onto scarves, mugs and bags and sold in the Ashgate Hospice shops to help raise money for this wonderful charity from our local area.

This has enabled students to see how all modes of art has an outlet in the world of work. A huge thank you to Miss Judd for championing this project. Year 9 Maths students are involved in a project linked with the Army where they are using their mathematical skills to complete army based tasks such as 'building barracks'. We will have more information on this project in the next newsletter. A huge thank you to Miss New for all her hard work with this project.

KS3 and KS4 PE students will be getting stuck in with the fire service next term by completing endurance tests and taking a look inside a real fire engine. Again the aim of this project is to help students make the link between their PE skills and knowledge and how that would link to a real life job. 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### **Magistrates Court Mock Trial Competition**

Brookfield Community School in Chesterfield is celebrating after 17 students took part in a regional competition on 16 March 2019, at South Derbyshire Magistrates' Court in Derby's historic Courthouse.

The Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition is a national active learning project organised by **The Citizenship Foundation**, an independent charity which helps young people to engage with their community through education.

The Competition involved a team of students taking on the roles of magistrates, lawyers, witnesses and court staff to prepare a specially written case. Schools compete against each other in a live format at a real magistrates' court. The team, comprising Year 8 and Year 9 students, rehearsed over a number of months, supported by former participants in Years 11 and 12, as well as local magistrates and members of the legal profession. The competition was tough, with the Brookfield team enjoying the day but not able to pip the winners to progress to the next round.

Hope remains in the shape of the Year 8 Court Artists and Reporters who will now submit their entries to their respective competitions, based on images and events in the court proceedings.

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### **Brookfield's Duke of Edinburgh Award**

With the arrival of spring the new D of E season has properly begun. First out were the Gold cohort on their Gold Day Walk. This usually takes place in November, but was switched to March. The day dawned bright and breezy and whilst the weather threatened all-day the rain held off. The students undertook a challenging route up and around the southern edges of the Kinder Plateau, before reaching the Kinder Low, one of the very highest parts of the county. The other half of the route was along Jacob 's Ladder and the Pennine Way to Edale. In all both students and staff had a great day on the hill, with many of the lessons from Bronze and Silver DofE being remembered prior to the forthcoming Practice Expedition in May.

March also saw the Bronze cohort out on their first proper D of E weekend as they all took part in the Bronze Training Expedition. The teams were split between two start points, with all groups walking to Barn Farm, Birchover. The main aim of this walk is to bring the lessons of the classroom to life with the reality of having to navigate, pitch camp and cook for real. Again the weather was really kind, with bright skies and sunshine for the most part, with only a stiff breeze and a brief overnight shower to complain about. On this expedition the students are accompanied by the staff throughout and whilst the first day is more about instruction, the second day is about letting students begin to make their own decisions and mistakes in order to prepare them for their Practice Expedition. Once again it was another great weekend thoroughly enjoyed by students and staff alike.

There has continued to be a steady trickle of awards completed with eight Gold Awards completed – many of whom have been invited to a Buckingham Palace Garden Party to receive their awards. Whilst last year's Bronze cohort stands at 35 completions, with only one student left to finish. Hopefully it will be another cohort of 100% bronze completions.

As ever the D of E relies heavily on the Brookfield staff past and present who continue to volunteer their time freely in order to make, in particular, the expeditions such a success. It has been great to see a number of new staff out on expeditions for the first time and whilst it can be as much of a learning curve for staff as for students their support, presence, contribution and desire to help are very much appreciated. There is also continuing thanks to the staff within the school who help to prepare letters, laminated maps, deal with the financing of trips and the purchasing of equipment; their contributions are equally as invaluable.

Outstanding performances from all the girls saw them win a final deciding doubles game to gain sweet revenge on Eckington and lift the trophy.

The KS4 boys team of Jack Barker-Sabido, James Allen, Ben Laben, Luca Finch and Abee Kapoor were up against some tough opposition. They played some remarkable badminton on their way to the final setting up a mouth-watering contest against Chapel who were reining champions. Our lads truly played out of their skins and pushed Chapel all the way but ultimately we came up just a little short. 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### Year 10 Young Enterprise



Sixteen students from Year 10 took on the challenge of setting up and running a mini-enterprise company to represent Brookfield in the NE Derbyshire Young Enterprise competition. However, they had to overcome a major disadvantage, they were starting over three months later than the other companies in the competition.

Nonetheless, Inspired Designs, formed in January, have shown impressive flair for enterprise, and have achieved great success. After some market research they set about producing and selling seasonal inspired gift boxes with a focus on visual appeal and sustainable packaging. With boxes containing chocolates and jewellery for special occasions such as Valentine's Day, Mothers' Day and Easter.

Part of the competition involves a trade fair where companies have to display, promote and sell their products directly to the public. This year it was held in the Pavements Precinct in Chesterfield from 10am to 3pm. As a result of some 'go out and get them' selling techniques and by targeting the little old lady market segment they quickly sold out of stock and took over £300 on the day. Great work by Emily Banks, Alice Woodcock and Max Henshaw. But ever member of the company played their part that day. And by keeping a close eye on costs the company has been able to make over 50% gross profit on sales.

At the Showcase Final held at the Chesterfield Library on Tues 2<sup>nd</sup> April companies were required to set up stall again, present a company report and be interviewed, Dragons' Den style, by a panel of judges. Not for the faint hearted. Then the final challenge was an evening presentation before a large audience of students, teachers, business advisers, judges and parents. Quite daunting for most but Nathan Dave, Gabriella Mainiero, Max Henshaw (the Beast) and Emma Barron performed with great gusto and confidence.

Inspired Designs were competing against older students and some excellent companies from St Mary's High School, Eckington, Dronfield Henry Fanshawe, Mount St Mary's and Lady Manners. However, they won the award for Best Financial Management but unfortunately were not able to make it through to the County Final. Congratulations to all company members for their teamwork and willingness to give it a go.

And finally many thanks to our Business Advisers Julie Taylor and Ian Greenaway of MTM Labels, Chesterfield for the support, encouragement and guidance given to our students.

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### **News from the Modern Languages Dept**

#### German Exchange

On Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> February 18 students from the Viktoriaschule in Darmstadt came to England for the first leg of the Viktoriaschule and Brookfield School exchange. Many of the German students had never visited England before so this was a new experience for them. They went on many trips such as the medical museum in Leeds and Treak Cliff Cavern in Bakewell. One of the trips which both the German and English students went on was to York which was a great chance to get to know our partners whilst doing some sightseeing.

At the start of the 10 days we understandably didn't know our partners but seeing them leave was "sehr traurig" (very sad)! At the weekend we had the chance to give our partners an insight into our preferred activities in and around Chesterfield. On the Wednesday the students came to school with us and accompanied us to our lessons which gave them a feel for life in an English school. On the last night of their visit the whole group went bowling together which was a great chance to spend some quality time with our partners before their departure.



We would highly recommend an exchange to anyone who is given the opportunity to do so because not only is it beneficial to your language skills but also it is a great way to make friends with someone of a different cultural background. #### Spanish Exchange/Work Experience

The return leg of the Spanish Exchange took place from Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> January to Friday 4<sup>th</sup> February with a total of 20 Brookfield students from Years 11 and 12 taking part this year. They were hosted by their partners, from our partner school in Andújar, Jaén, who had visited Chesterfield in November 2018. During their 9 day stay, the students enjoyed a guided tour of Andújar and a reception with the Mayor at the Town Hall and excursions to Seville and Granada In addition to these visits all the English students completed three days' work experience in local primary schools. All the English students were glad of the opportunity to practise their Spanish. George Harris (Year 11) had this to say about their experience of this leg of the exchange......

"Right now in school I'm taking GCSE Spanish and last month I took part in the second half of my Spanish exchange program and I can honestly say it's one of the best things I've ever done.

I was so nervous when we started travelling to the little town of Andújar in the south of Spain, primarily because I was going there to live in a stranger's house for ten days and I'm not very good at Spanish. Don't get me wrong, I know the basics and I'm not the worst in my class but I'm certainly not the best, so having to speak Spanish for over a week in a completely foreign place was obviously daunting.

I found myself on the coach from Málaga airport to my "Impending doom" frantically flicking through the little, overpriced phrasebook I bought at East Midlands' W H Smith. That turned out to be a futile attempt though because my overhead light was broken, it was pitch black outside and Spanish street lamps don't seem to be very powerful. I gave up and just started stressing which was probably not productive but at least it wasn't just jumping out of the coach and walking back to Chesterfield which did cross my mind at the time.

It all turned out ok though. My host family were amazing, I went to Seville for a day trip and I even got to watch Real Madrid vs Barcelona in a basement which was very special for me. And turns out, to my surprise, not once was I banished from the country because of my shoddy use of the local lingo.

If I had given in to my nervousness and fear I would never have been able to experience some really great moments. (And have ten days off school) I'm also glad I didn't wuss out because of the improvements to my Spanish, listening to people talk in a language you don't really understand is unsurprisingly a great way to improve your listening skills. So go outside your comfort zone, even if it makes you feel nervous or awkward. You could reap great rewards from it. I know I would have regretted it if I hadn't."



### **Viktoriaschule Work Experience in Chesterfield**

This week eight 15 and 16 year old students and two teachers from our partner school in Darmstadt, the Viktoriaschule have been visiting Chesterfield as part of our mutual work experience programme.

Although we were unable to run a Work experience trip to Darmstadt this year, the German students have still been able to come to Chesterfield to do two weeks work experience in primary schools in the area. They have enjoyed helping in lessons and experiencing the British School system. They

had the opportunity to meet up with some of our Year 12 students at the weekend and also visited Chatsworth House and Meadowhall.

They have found it a very valuable experience where they have been able to improve their English language, experience the world of work and experience a different culture.



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
