Duke of Edinburgh Award

As ever the new academic year began with last year's Bronze and Gold students presenting in the Hall to their friends and family about their exploits on DofE, thus bringing to a close a very successful 2015-16 year.

September sees the recruitment of both new cohorts, and 40 intrepid Year 10s and 21 Year 12s signed up for the Bronze and Gold awards respectively. After the first few after-school lessons both groups have had their first taste of an expedition with the annual Day Walks.

The Bronze students met in October for a route on the hills around Castleton, taking in the views from Mam Tor and Lose Hill, whilst also traversing the Great Ridge in between. Supported by 15 members of staff, the six groups had a great day in superb autumn weather. Early morning mist gave way to blue sky and sunshine as teams practised navigation skills alongside team-building and communication.

The last event of the year is the BCS Gold Day walk in November. It is one of the last expeditions allowed by Derbyshire DofE and the idea is to step-up from Bronze and Silver and challenge the students in the toughest terrain in the Peak District with hopefully some inclement weather thrown in for good measure. The weather did not

disappoint, with heavy overnight rain leading to saturated conditions on the ground and a persistent heavy drizzle in the air. The challenging 12.5 mile route over some of the highest ground in the Peak District, in near zero visibility, gave the students the ideal conditions to test and develop their own navigation, teamwork and leadership skills. All in all it was an ideal end to the year and should have set our Gold students on track for success in the Lake District in the summer.

Once again the success of DofE over the last 12-months would not be possible without the commitment of the staff who volunteer their time to support all the expeditions. Over the last year 18 different members of staff have deployed on expeditions giving up their time, expertise and energy in supporting our students, without them BCS DofE would not happen. Further thanks also to the in school staff who help to prepare letters, maps and deal with the financing of trips and equipment, their contributions are equally as invaluable.

EMPLOYABILITY



Hot off the press for this year:

We have introduced the Brookfield EMPLOYABILITY PASSPORT to all

students from Year 7 to Year 11.

This is kept in the student's planner and provides a useful way for students to record and reflect upon employability skills that they have experienced. This is an area that is featuring high on the Government's agenda at the moment as employers feel that although students are leaving school with adequate qualifications, they often lack the employability skills that make them 'work ready'.

As a result the Government has outlined 10 Employability Goals that they want all students to have experienced by the time they reach the end of Year 11 as well as wanting all students to have had six meaningful encounters with an employer. Having completed a whole school audit, we can confirm that we do already provide Brookfield students with the opportunities to meet these goals and employer encounters.

The passport simply gives students a place to record these experiences so that they refer to them confidently when completing application forms or planning for interviews.

We would also like to thank United Cast Bar who have endorsed our Employability logo.

POST 16 OPTIONS

It has been that time of year again when our Year 11 students start to think about their



next steps. They have all taken part in the Post 16 carousel during PSHE lessons where they get the opportunity to research possible progression routes and gain valuable information and advice about completing application forms and preparing and presenting themselves properly in interviews. A large number of our Year 11 students attended the Skills Festival at the Pro-act Stadium in September where they visited further education stalls and researched possible progression routes. All of our Year 11 students have completed a mock application and have had a mock interview with a local employer. Despite feeling nervous, the students found the experience incredibly rewarding in terms of overcoming their fears and having an opportunity to experience a 'real' interview in a more supportive environment.

Students and parents have also attended the Post 16 Evening where they were given

advice and guidance on possible Post 16 routes as well as an opportunity to speak to local further education providers. Remember there are no limits on how many applications a student can make. We would always strongly recommend that students have at least one back up plan.

A reminder that for those students wishing to apply to Brookfield Sixth Form, the deadline for applications is 27 January. For details about other local Sixth Form and College open days and deadlines, please see details on the careers section of our school website.

Year 9 OPTIONS

In January, our Year 9 students will start making their first big choices about which



GCSE options they want to choose. To support them with this we will be having a Year 9 Options Drop Down Day on Wednesday 18 January where they will receive subject specific talks, advice about how to make good choices and a chance to speak to some further education providers. This will be followed by an Options Evening and Year 9 Parents evening to give parents the opportunity to discuss these important choices further with their child's class teachers. The deadline for Year 9 students to return their options form to their Form Tutor is Thursday 9 February 2017.

POST 18 OPTIONS



Y13 students have been working hard on their personal statements for UCAS or researching alternative progression routes for Post-18.

OXBRIDGE VISITS



Twenty Year 11 students and thirteen Year 12 students have visited Corpus Christie for the day. The students were selected because they have the GCSE profile to enable them to apply to Oxford or Cambridge if they wish to.

The day was hugely successful and the students enjoyed visiting the quaint 'Hogwart' style buildings where they met with current students. They were given information about the Oxbridge admissions

process and also faced their fears by taking part in a real Oxbridge style mock interview.



COCA COLA CHALLENGE




Twenty five of our Year 12 students are currently involved in the national competition: Coca Cola Challenge. The challenge

involves Business Studies students working in teams (or "small companies" as we like to refer to it!) to develop a healthy juice drink brand. The drink must carry an on-pack promotion that encourages young people, aged 14-25, to get involved with Special Olympics Great Britain's Play Unified campaign. The students presented their idea in November. The best two ideas: 'Juci' and 'Fruitzooka' were submitted to the Coca-Cola European Partners for judging and although they weren't successful in going through, it was a great learning experience.

The RBC is designed to help students develop and demonstrate enterprise skills, and in particular to develop teamwork, problem-solving, creative thinking, leadership, financial capability, and business acumen. If our students do well, they will get the chance to work with representatives from Coca-Cola and they could even win some exciting prizes.

Urban Studies Cross-Curricular Fieldwork Day

They not only learned about the Geography and History of the town, but gaining fieldwork and research skills from compass bearings; 4 and 6 figure grid references; land-use data collection; to note collection and looking for historical clues in the building and street layouts.

Bletchley Park By Mr Pritchett

Computer Science students visited Bletchley park in October. The site of the historic code breaking activities in WW2 now houses the rebuild of Colossus, the World's first electronic computer and is now home to the National Museum of Computing. After a presentation on codebreaking, students observed the process that was undertaken to help break German codes, viewed the running Colossus computer and encountered significant computing artefacts over the years. This in a very practical way demonstrated the effect of Moore's Law over the last 50 years. From hard drives the size of washing machines and memory modules that could not be lifted, the astounding changes in technology we take for granted was brought home. Every year we learn more about the fascinating events at Bletchley Park that have remained shrouded in secrecy and have denied Britain its place in computer history for so long. Russia Trip



After half term students returned from an 'out of this world' visit to Moscow where they met cosmonauts who had been to the International Space Station (ISS).



Jack Jerram, a Year 10 student said he learned a lot on the trip. He said "It was an amazing trip — a real out of this world experience. We explored markets, visited the Red Square, the Kremlin and of course visited a replica of the ISS, spending time talking to people who had already been into space. I learned that cosmonauts have to train for a minimum of five to six years before they can even be considered for a trip to space".



"They generally find out a week or two before the mission, which if they haven't been selected, seems a lot of work to find out at the eleventh hour that you cannot go." Some students got to try on authentic space-suits and put questions to Alexander Samokutyaev and Sergey and Alexander Volkov. A highlight for Jack was seeing Yuri Gagarin's rocket. Yuri Gagarin was a Russian Soviet pilot and cosmonaut.



He was the first human to journey into outer space, when his aircraft completed an orbit of the earth back in 1961. Jack said "Seeing the rocket was a real highlight for me, something I had been looking forward to for a long time. I enjoyed the trip, it was a great experience. I enjoyed finding out about a different culture, and was the first person in my family to travel to Russia so I have been telling them all about it. The only downside was the food. It seems that beetroot and cabbage are added extras at almost every meal, so if you didn't like either of those you were in trouble!"





The trip was launched about 18 months ago, when students were asked if they would be interested in going. 42 students signed up. Over the 18 month planning period, students held numerous fundraisers to try and help boost the fund to pay for the trip. They held a bagpacking event at Morrisons in Walton and sold gifts at the annual Brookfield Christmas Market. The youngsters were also taught Russian words and learned about the country's history, embassy, education and culture in the run up to the trip.



The behaviour of the students on the trip was exceptional and everyone returned having had a truly outstanding experience.

German Work Experience



At the end November all the students from the Year 12 and Year 13 German classes went on the Work Experience visit to Germany. They stayed in families with students from our partner school the Viktoriaschule in Darmstadt which is twinned with Chesterfield. During the week they went to work every day; placements included working in a café, solicitor's office, music shop, charity bookshop, primary school, design firm and shadowing a judge. The placements were chosen according to the students' interests. As well as gaining an insight in to the world of world in Germany, they were able to greatly improve their language skills and enjoyed the experience of living in a German family. Additional activities included a tour of the Mathildenhöhe where there are many examples of Jugendstil architecture to help our students with the art and architecture in Germany section of the A Level syllabus. Although the weather was very cold, they also enjoyed a trip to the Christmas Market as well as attending the Viktoriaschule Christmas concert which was amazing. At the weekend their host families took them on various outings to visit local towns and sights including Frankfurt and Heidelberg. They were also lucky enough to be in Germany on the 6th December and all woke up to presents from St Nikolaus as is the tradition. They are looking forward to the return leg of the visit in March when their partners will be coming to Chesterfield for their own work experience although it has been commented that the German host families have set the bar very high in terms of hospitality!

Language Ambassadors

During their nine day stay, the Spanish students had the opportunity to visit Chatsworth House, Bakewell, York, Chesterfield Town Hall to meet the Mayor and they also took part in a guided tour of Chesterfield. In addition to these visits all Spanish students completed a two day work experience either in a local primary school or local café. All Spanish students were glad of the opportunity to practise their English and it will definitely be something we will be keen to repeat next year. Isobel Hall and Georgia Dodsworth (Year 12) had this to say about their experience of this leg of the exchange . . .

During early November, we had the pleasure of meeting our exchange partners Maria and Noelia. The Spanish exchange as a whole was rewarding and fun and really helped us to develop our Spanish fluency. We learnt useful common phrases that our partners commonly use which then enabled us to use language that often only natives would use. Having the girls here really showed us some of the different Spanish cultural influences which are woven into everyday life which, we're sure will be amplified greatly when we visit them in January. The exchange overall was great and gave us new skills such as adapting to unknown situations, and a new and more challenging level of communication. We cannot wait to go to Andújar in the New Year!



Online Safety

Online Safety is an important part of keeping children safe at Brookfield Community School. Online Safety is taught to all pupils and our curriculum empowers students to understand and be aware how they can to stay safe and behave appropriately online but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work with you.

Your help is needed to talk to your children about how they can keep themselves safe and behave appropriately online. It's important that we are all vigilant when children are using the internet and act to ensure they are protected from people who may pose a risk to them. Children can accidently or deliberately be exposed to illegal, unwanted or unpleasant content, comments or activity online and there are steps you can take at home to minimise this risk.

What can parents do to help children keep safe online?

Follow the "Gold"en Rules.

GROUND RULES

- Discuss together as a family how the internet will be used in your house. Consider what information should be kept private (such as personal information, photos in school uniform etc) and decide rules for making and meeting online friends. Ensure your children know the risks of accepting friends' requests from strangers online and make sure you know what your child is doing online; much like you would offline.
- Discuss using strong passwords with your child so they understand how they can protect their online accounts- talk about keeping passwords safe e.g. not sharing them with anyone or use the same password for several accounts. If your child's account is "hacked" or compromised then make sure they change their password and report any concerns or suspicious activity. - Consider locating your child's computers and laptops in a family area but be aware that children access the internet on mobile phones, games consoles and tablets so use can't always be supervised.
- Be especially aware of settings rules relating to your child's use of webcams and any applications or devices which allow voice or video chat. Childnet have useful information for young people about using webcams safely.

ONLINE SAFETY

Install antivirus software, secure your internet connection and use Parental Control functions for computers, mobile phones and games consoles to block unsuitable content or contact from unknown people. Research different parental control software and tools available for your home and select the tools which are most suitable to you, your child and the technology in your home. Visit sites like www.internetmatters.org, www.getsafeonline.org and www.saferinternet.org.uk/adviceand-resources/a-parents-quide for safety information and advice about parental controls on consoles and devices and how to report concerns.



 Make sure you read any parental guidance and safety recommendations (including age requirements – most popular social networking sites and apps are only for users aged 13+, 16+ or 18+) for any apps or websites before allowing your child to use them - visit <u>www.net-</u> <u>aware.org.uk</u>

 Always remember that parental control tools are not always 100% effective and sometimes unsuitable content can get past them, so don't rely on them alone to protect your child.

LISTEN

- Take an active interest in your child's life online and talk openly with them about the things they do. Talk to your child and ask them to show or even teach you how they use the internet, learn which websites or tools they like to use and why. Learning together with your child can often open opportunities to discuss safe behaviour online.
- To start a conversation with your child you could tell them that you understand that some young people share images and videos online and that you're interested to know what they think about it and how they think they can keep themselves safe.

DIALOGUE - KEEP TALKING

Ensure that your child knows that once a picture, video or comment is sent or posted online, then it can be very difficult to remove as other people can forward it and share it with others, without them even knowing.

Online Safety (continued)

- Always ensure your child knows how to report and block people online who may send nasty or inappropriate messages or content. Encourage your child not to retaliate or reply to cyberbullying and to keep any evidence.
- Make sure your child knows it's important that they tell an adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel scared, worried or uncomfortable.

Remember, the internet is an essential part of young people's lives and provides them with tremendous opportunities. The vast majority use it without coming to any harm so it's essential to be realistic: banning the internet or web sites often will not work and it can make a child feel less able to report a problem or concern, so education around safe use is essential.

Changes to GCSE Grading Mrs Mason



Reformed GCSEs were gradually introduced from September 2015. Initially this was for English Language, English Literature and Maths. These new GCSEs are graded from 9 to 1, instead of A* to G.

Students who started their GCSEs in September 2016 are studying the new GCSEs in all of their subjects except Business Studies, Product Design, RMT and ICT. They will receive 9 to 1 grades for the new GCSEs and A* to G grades for the legacy GCSEs.

The top grade of the new GCSE is 9, decreasing down to 1.

The grading for the new GCSEs is be structured so that:

- broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 4 and above as currently achieve a grade C and above,
- broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 7 and above as currently achieve a grade A and above,
- the bottom of grade 1 will be aligned with the bottom of grade G,
- a grade 5 will be awarded to the top third of students gaining the equivalent of a grade C or bottom third of a grade B,
- the top 20 per cent of those who get a grade 7 or above in each exam will be awarded a grade 9.


