Curriculum

Our vision is for all of our students to have high aspirations, and to be confident, independent and resilient individuals. They will achieve excellence and become life-long learners, well prepared for the modern workplace. This will lead them to be responsible, respectful and active citizens who can make a positive contribution to society.

In Years 7-9 students will study:

During Year 9 we advise students about their options for education between the ages of 14 and 19, and undertake career planning activities. We invite parents to be part of the decision making process. Students who achieve the appropriate qualifications at GCSE to study A-levels or a vocational qualification will, at 16, be able to apply to Brookfield's Sixth Form.

Co-Curricular Opportunities



We define the curriculum as everything that happens in school and everything that the young people who attend our school experience and learn. In that sense, it is not just about the academic knowledge and skills delivered in lessons but also the array of opportunities and experiences we offer to our students outside the classroom. Student wellbeing is at the heart of everything we do. In addition to the students' timetabled day, the school encourages student involvement in our Co-Curricular Programme. The aim of this is to enrich student lives and improve wellbeing through encouraging student engagement with learning opportunities outside of their lessons. Students taking on specific leadership roles and an involvement in the broader life of the school and the community will only lead to a greater development of their character. It is vital that we develop outward looking students who want to contribute to the community they live in.

Shoes

School shoes must be plain black, made of a conventional material which can be polished, without coloured logos, tags or soles. Trainer style shoes are not permitted. Further information can be found on our website.

The school does not allow jewellery to be worn (i.e., rings, nose studs and necklaces), It will, however, accept the wearing of one small stud in each ear but will not accept the responsibility for it when it must be removed for sport. Facial piercings are not acceptable on grounds of health and safety. Students who break the rule and wear jewellery will be asked to remove it.

Hairstyles

Extreme hairstyles are not permitted. This includes, but is not limited to, vivid colours, very short shaved hair, tramlines and patterns.

Make up and nails

Make up should not be obvious. False nails, acrylic or excessively long natural nails and false eyelashes are not permitted at any time and are considered a health and safety issue.

Mobile Phones

The school does not permit the use of mobile phones at school. Where parents wish for students to have a mobile phone with them to use to and from school, the mobile phone should be switched off and remain in the students' bag. Where phones are seen by staff they will be confiscated for parental collection at a later date and an afternoon detention issued.

Pastoral Support

At Brookfield Community School every student matters. To do this we have developed systems to support their academic, social and personal needs, as well as having a comprehensive Personal Development Programme.

Students are organised into vertical tutor groups. Each tutor group is made up of a number of approximately 30 students from each year group from Years 7 to 11. Each day tutees meet for 25 minutes with their form tutor in a programme called Life 360. This session covers some of our Personal Development Programme and cultural capital sessions. The tutors should be the first point of contact for students or parents who have any concerns.



Brookfield House System

All students belong to a House. Our Houses are named after five local Peak District edges. Each vertical tutor group belongs to one of our 5 houses – Baslow, Birchen, Curbar, Froggatt and Gardom's. Each House has a Head of House who leads the team of tutors.

All staff are assigned to a House and work together to build an ethos of aspiration and support, further preparing students for their futures. One of the benefits of a house system is the opportunities it provides for students to become involved in wider school activities beyond their academic studies. The house points system creates a blend of healthy competition by encouraging students to participate by representing their House in a range of activities.

Personal Development

Tutors deliver a range of activities during Life 360 sessions. We aim to develop students' personally, socially, morally and help them to prepare for their role as citizens in the future. Each week students take part in activities based around personal, social, citizenship and health education (PSHCE), enabling our young people to understand themselves and the changes they will experience as they mature into adulthood.



Topics include citizenship, relationships and sex, drugs and alcohol awareness, financial capability and entrepreneurial skills. Students also have a comprehensive career's programme delivered and co-curricular opportunities.

Personal development is also covered across the entire curriculum and during drop down days to deliver age-appropriate PSHCE.



Admissions Policy

Applications to Year 7 are managed through the Derbyshire County Council, where you will find helpful guidance on how to apply for a secondary place.

Where the number of applications for admission exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied in the order set out below, to decide which children to admit:

1. Looked after children or children who have been previously looked after
2. Children who, at the time of application, will have a brother or sister attending the school
3. Other children who live in the catchment area at the closing date of application

4. Other children who live outside the catchment area at the closing date of application

If applications exceed the number of places available, the school will operate a waiting list, in which priority for places will be given on the basis of this criteria.

Students who have a statement of special education needs and where the school is named in the child's statement, will be admitted.

Measuring distance

In the event of over-subscription within any criteria, preference will be given to children who live nearest to the school as the crow flies. Distances are measured from the entrance to the main administrative building of the school by the local authority which currently uses a computerised measuring system.

In-year admissions

In-year applications need to be made through the Local Authority. If a place is not available in the year group for which a student applies, the application will be refused and placed on the waiting list. Names are placed on the waiting list in the rank order of our published over-subscription criteria, not in the date order by which they are received. Parents have the right to appeal the refusal of a place.
